MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



2020 was a challenging year but incredible things continue to happen when our community comes together. For those who follow our work closely know that in 2019 we introduced a new Big Brothers Big Sisters to the world with a reinvigorated brand, theory of change and a rallying call for Canadians to join our movement. 2020 was a year that tested our theory of change and exemplify that mentoring relationships are not a just a nice service but an essential service.

It is clear that mentoring relationships support the critical social and emotional development needed to help build resilience and promote the mental health and wellbeing of communities' young people. Caring, supportive developmental relationships are critical intervention for young people facing adversity. In 2020 we had the opportunity to empower more young people and recruit additional volunteers then we have ever did in the past 40 years. 352 young people in wood buffalo were provided over 40,268 hours of mentorship through our one-to-one, site- based and group programming. This would not have been possible without our incredible volunteers. Our volunteers contributed, 37,000+ hours of their own time during a year when the times were trying. We are endlessly grateful for your willingness to do whatever it takes to ensure our young people have the connection, guidance, and support they need.

Our fantastic team pivoted our service delivery approach to administer online virtual programs when the stay at home orders were put in place. They found new ways to not only do their work but also refine, adjust existing programs and practices. Our donors and partners stepped up and stood by our side to ensure we had the resources to do our work. Our sincerest thank you for your trust, generosity, and working with us to ensure no young person is left behind.

As we continue to operate under uncertain times, we are excited about the year(s) to come. With a new strategic direction put in place in the fall of 2020. We will continue to focus on providing high quality evidence based programming, expanding our reach, sharing our stories and raising awareness about the impacts of mentoring.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS



As I reflect on my first year as the board chair for Big Brothers Big Sisters Wood Buffalo, I feel a deep sense of gratitude and awe. These feelings most certainly stem from the incredible work that was accomplished by the Staff, Board and Donors during what has been the most challenging year I have experienced in Fort McMurray. Between the flood, pandemic and resulting economic downturn in the region I found myself wondering "How much hardship can this community withstand?" As it turns out we can withstand a tremendous amount albeit this time we have some significant emotional injuries.

Fred Rodgers of Mr. Rodgers Neighborhood fame states "When I was a boy and I would see scary things in the news my mother would say to me, 'Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping." This iconic quote sums up what I experienced in 2020. Our donors, staff and board found creative ways to immediately show up in force. The BBBSWB staff in Fort McMurray was one of, if not the first to transition to virtual program delivery. They found ways to get technology into the hands of kids who wanted it so they could participate and were able to serve more families than ever before in our history. Our Donors quietly gave us the financial resources to keep operating when our fundraising events were cancelled one after another. There was no fanfare but rather extremely generous gifts when we needed them the most.

Our board worked hard to become a cohesive team and came together to build a new strategic plan designed to meet the needs of the community in this volatile environment. Even in the height of the pandemic the team continuously dedicates their time to ensuring BBBSWB remains strong for our clients. On a recent zoom board meeting I felt humbled as each board member shared from their hearts their individual struggles and then proceeded to have an effective and productive session.

Our Clients remained loyal and found ways to participate and continue their life's growth journey despite the new ways of participating. I think it speaks volumes to the value of the programs and the resilience of the participants. I am a student of life long learning and witnessing the growth of the programs reinforced my belief in the value we create together.

I think It takes very special people to continuously show up as helpers when they themselves are embroiled in the crisis. I am humbly honored to be associated with the Staff, Donors, Clients and Board of The Big Brothers Big Sisters Wood Buffalo organization who have somehow managed to continue serving the community and participating in programs despite the challenges of the past year.

ONE TO ONE COMMUNITY BASED PROGRAM

The Big Brother Big Sister one-to-one community-based programs, matches a Little aged 6-18 years with a Big aged 18+ based on mutual experiences and shared interests. The pair meet for eight hours per month in our community and build a healthy, caring relationship that can last a lifetime. Not only do we foster relationships that allow children to thrive, but we reduce risk-taking behaviour and support healthy development.

ONE TO ONE IN SCHOOL MENTORING



The In-School Mentoring (ISM) program, volunteer mentors are matched with children and youth, identified as needing additional support in schools across Wood Buffalo. Children referred to the ISM program may face any one of a variety of barriers to educational success. The mentor and mentee meet for one hour weekly, in school, during the school-day. Children who participate in ISM have improved connection to their school community, improved academic performance, improved attendance and higher educational attainment. The ISM program was put on hold in March 2020 when the students moved to online learning. Matches were provided the opportunity to move to a community based match so they may meet outside of school hours



This made in Wood Buffalo program serves young people ages 6-12 years. This is the agencies largest group mentoring program with up to 14 active programs at one time within the elementary schools in our region. The goal is to provide meaningful group mentoring experience that strengthens cultural awareness and pride among our regions Indigenous young people. Although they students moved to online learning in 2020, the Full Circle Program also moved virtual to finish out the school year. In the fall in 2020, when the students returned to the classroom the program ran in person at select schools, in cohort groups following AHS guidelines.

CORPORATE MENTORING

The corporate mentoring program provides Indigenous youth living in rural reservations the opportunity to be mentored by corporate employees. The program focuses on career and life skills, opening their world view to many new possibilities. This group mentoring program is a relationship between ConocoPhillips employees and students at Father R. Perin School in Janvier. In the fall of 2020 the BBBS Team with support from ConocoPhillips explored new ways to administer the program virtually.

GAME ON GROUP MENTORING PROGRAM

The main goal of the Game On! program is to develop an appreciation of the benefits of an active, healthy lifestyle among boys and young men. In addition, the program provides participants with the tools they require to implement an active, healthy lifestyle. Each session is loosely structured around three themes: physical activity, healthy eating, and self-esteem and communication skills



GO GIRLS GROUP MENTORING PROGRAM

Go Girls! is a group mentoring program for girls ages 9-13 that focuses on physical activity, balanced eating and self-esteem. The single, most important goal of the program is to positively shape the lives of young women and girls by helping them build a positive self-image – setting them on a path to reach their full potential in life.


